

On July 15, 2021, the National Urban League released the highly anticipated annual report, State of Black America. As we know, the COVID-19 pandemic changed the world and put a spotlight on racial inequities. The report stated that we can't go back to the "old normal" but we can build a better future. This year's report explores why an inclusive and equitable society is the only path forward.

Higher unemployment rates, lower household incomes and lack of access to health care left Black Americans more vulnerable to the Covid-19 pandemic and there is an urgency to address these structural inequities, according to the report.

The report titled "The New Normal: Diverse, Equitable & Inclusive," concluded that Black people are facing the burden of "three pandemics," which include racial inequity in health care, economics, and public safety.

There is a need for change and unity in our country. Courageous and moral leadership is imperative to bridge the divide in the United States. This year has been historic for many reasons starting with the intersection of the pandemic, which grossly highlighted health disparities in Black and Brown communities and the racial tensions that surfaced nationally with the police killings of one too many Black Americans.

Over the past 96 years, YOUR Akron Urban League has worked to improve the quality of life of the citizens of Summit County by advocating and facilitating programs that are economically and educationally transformational, impacting their lives and the lives of future generations.

The pandemic and the civil unrest highlighted the need for an organization like the Akron Urban League and generated a demand on our agency, one like I've never experienced in 27 years of non-profit work. As we move forward and prepare for the challenges that we will face uniting the country, we look forward to connecting to organizations and community members to educate, host, and bring together diverse groups of individuals who have different viewpoints and perspectives to gain a deeper understanding of one another to ultimately affect REAL change.

The staff and board of the Akron Urban League remain devoted in our work to impress upon corporate and community leaders, and elected officials, the urgency of confronting legislation and the wave of anti-voter tactics that is surging through state legislatures and the pervasive issue of racism that continues to be deeply imbedded into America's systems. We need our community at large to be in the fight with us, support our work with your time, talent and treasure and be our allies in the fight for equality. Community PPE Distribution

The Akron Urban League distributed over 1,400 personal protective equipment (PPE) kits to organizations in Summit County in April and May. COVID-19 Vaccination Clinic

In partnership with AxessPointe Community Health Centers and the Akron NAACP the Akron Urban League hosted a vaccination clinic on site. Community members were able to speak directly with physicians and learn about the Johnson & Johnson vaccination and get vaccinated. 2021 Scholarship Fund

Unfortunately, we could not have our Annual Meeting and Scholarship Luncheon this year due to the pandemic. However, we were still able to provide scholarships to Summit County graduating seniors. The Akron Urban League, in partnership with corporations, foundations, community organizations, individual supporters, and schools in Summit County had the privilege of awarding 47 scholarships or \$255,556 in funds to local high school students.

There were five "full-ride" scholarships awarded to students: two from The University of Akron, two from Kent State University for four years each, and one to Stark State College for a two-year program.

In place of a luncheon, we published a scholarship awardee recognition video to YouTube and on our website the week of July 12th. We were delighted to revel with them and celebrate their outstanding academic achievements.

High tunnels are unheated greenhouses for all types of crops. The AUL's high tunnel is Ohio's 100th seasonal High Tunnel from the **United States** Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resource Conservation Service and was constructed during former Congresswoman Marica Fudge's representation of Ohio's 11th District.
