

AUL JAYLAND WALKER STATEMENT

The Akron Urban League grieves with the community for the senseless killing of Jayland Walker, a 25-year-old Black man whose body was riddled with 60 bullets by several Akron Police officers. WE empathize and offer our condolences to Jayland's family, who described him as a sweet and kind young man who never caused any trouble. WE stand with the family and community and demand transparency from the Akron Police Department. WE urge the Akron Police Department to act swiftly and release all information about his death to ensure justice for Jayland and his family.

Unfortunately, Jayland Walker joins a long list of Black men and women killed by the police. According to data collected by Mapping the Violence, Black people are still killed at a higher rate than any other group. Nationally, Black people comprise 13 percent of the US population, yet they account for 27 percent of those killed by police in 2021. The National Urban League and its' affiliates are supporters of the Justice in Policing Act, which is a comprehensive approach to hold police accountable, end racial profiling, change the culture of law enforcement, empower communities, and build trust between law enforcement and our communities by addressing systemic racism and bias to help save lives.

"Our prayers are with the Walker family as they mourn the loss of their loved one. We join them and the community to seek truth, justice, accountability, and harmony in this disturbing incident. We encourage protesters to engage peacefully. As more details unfold and the bodyworn camera footage is reviewed and released, we urge for prompt justice for Jayland's family. The officers involved in the fatal shooting of Jayland Walker need to answer for this brutal loss of life," said Teresa R. LeGrair, President & CEO of the Akron Urban League.

"The AUL board of directors stand in solidarity with the Akron community in seeking justice, truth, and transparency about the circumstances surrounding Jayland Walker's shooting death. We must not forget that racial justice is non-negotiable and has to be sought after every single day," said Atty. H Alan Rothenbuecher, Akron Urban League Board Chair.



JAYLAND WALKER JOINT STATEMENT FROM AUL + NUL

"My heart is heavy after learning of yet another unarmed black man whose life was taken so violently and suddenly at the hands of police," said Marc H. Morial, President and CEO of the National Urban League. "Jayland Walker was pulled over for a routine traffic stop. Instead, he lost his life at the hands of eight officers who shot at him – one young man – at least 60 times. No matter the ultimate contributing factors, we know that this is the very definition of excessive force. These officers must be held accountable for each and every bullet because it is hard to imagine 60 shots were justified. We cannot sit idly by and watch as officers abuse the public's trust and take for granted the lives of Black men and women. Our Black lives must matter to them. Although President Biden passed an executive order on policing that would create a new national database of police misconduct, mandate the adoption of body-worn camera policies, and revise use of force policies, Congress still needs to pass legislation like the George Floyd Justice in Policing act to codify these practices into law. Jayland Walker and the others who have lost their lives deserve justice and this nation has a responsibility to make sure they get it."

"Jayland Walker's death, just like so many others, will forever change the Akron community," said Teresa LeGrair, President and CEO of the Akron Urban League. "Akron is home to hundreds of thousands of people who work here and who live here. This is our home, and we deserve to feel safe in it. Police officers have a duty to protect and serve our communities, and all citizens who live within them. This senseless tragedy is one that Black people are all too familiar with and is the direct result of policies, procedures, and attitudes that the Urban League and other advocates have fought for years to eliminate. The Urban League sends its prayers to Jayland's family and loved ones, and we are relieved to see that these eight officers are off the streets at least temporarily, but this is just a start. We will be working to ensure the police department and, if needed, the Department of Justice conducts a thorough investigation into how this stop was handled and how Jayland could have been shot 60 times. Moreover, we will continue to urge our national leaders to create a national standard to hold police officers accountable for their actions on the force and keep our communities safe from perpetrators – no matter who they are."



WHAT'S HAPPENING AT SUMMER CAMP?

Every day, our <u>Summer Camp</u> begins with a morning meeting. During this meeting, social-emotional learning is incorporated with Zones of Regulation. This curriculum allows campers to state their feelings relating to colored zones and, most importantly, how to self-regulate to remain in the Green Zone.

Campers are immersed in STEAM learning throughout the day. They participate in Mad Science in the morning, where they have experienced the Flight Academy, Camp Eureka, and <u>Brixology</u>. These inquiry-based STEAM lessons allow students to tap into their problem-solving and critical thinking skills while designing, engineering, and tackling real-world issues.

They look forward to a catered lunch from A Taste of Fine Dining daily. After running off calories during recess, they spend their afternoons with Crayola's Imagination Arts Academy. Our campers inspect wildlife and recreate what they've seen through portraits, Lego, and clay. They round out the week with a Fun Friday Field Trip. So far, our

campers have raced at the Soap Box Derby, ballroom danced with Dancing Classrooms, and scouted out the wildlife at the Akron Zoo!

MEET THE MCCAP COHORTS

The Minority Contractor Capital Access **Program** (MCCAP) is a collaboration between the Western Reserve Community Fund and the Akron Urban League that provides financial and technical assistance to Akron and Summit County-based minority, women, LGBTQ+, Veteran, and Disabled-owned businesses in the construction trades. Eligible businesses apply and are evaluated based on need, experience, and growth potential. Once accepted, those businesses are given the opportunity to apply for financial assistance in the form of shortterm loans to pay for costs related to specific construction contracts. Participants are also connected to educational resources, including training and certification programs to help their business grow. The program is designed to support minorityowned and disadvantaged construction businesses and provide them with the best tools for long-term success and stability.



JUNETEENTH VAX & VOTE BLITZ

On June 19, 1865, Union Army General Gordon Granger announced freedom for people enslaved in Texas, the last remaining state with institutional slavery in the former Confederacy. Today, the anniversary of that proclamation is celebrated as Juneteenth — officially declared a federal holiday one year ago.

Our FREEDOM DAY event brought over 100 people to celebrate with us, the kickoff to the Juneteenth weekend. Included in the day's revelry were voter registration booths and the mobile COVID-19 vaccination/booster unit. The community supported our celebration and came to have a great time. Festivities included a spotlight on AUL community programming and education, haircuts, manicures, massages, food, beverages, treat concessions, the Akron Fire Department Fire Truck, the Akron Police Department, and K-9 unit, local vendors, interactive games, raffles, and more.

"Our event was an amalgam of black history and local Akron experiences. As an organization, we are committed to cultivating inclusion, dignity, justice, and equality for all," said Alissa Shively, director of marketing and communications at the AUL. "We honored Juneteenth with a day of reflection and rejoicing. This holiday allows us to remember the lives of enslaved people and to recognize the contributions of members of the Black community," Shively said.
